A review of school Attendance Guidelines was undertaken by the Minster for Education in Term 4, 2017.

## The Minister of Education has said that all:

'schools must advise parents/guardians of unexplained absences, on the same day, as soon as practicable'.

The changes in the Attendance Guidelines were introduced at St Mary MacKillop P.S. as of Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> March, 2018.

If your child/ren are going to be absent from school for any reason, we ask that you log onto the sckool bag app, then go to eForms, hit Absentee Form and complete the details of the absence then hit submit.

- All Absentee forms go to the front office and to myself. They are then forwarded to the classroom teacher.
- If your child is away and we have not been notified, you will receive an SMS message asking you to contact the school. If we do not hear from you within a certain time we will call your emergency contacts. If we cannot reach the Emergency contacts we will then need to call the Police.
- If you have not yet downloaded the Skoolbag app we ask that you do this as soon as possible.

These practices are to ensure the safety of your children.
