

Dear Community,

Once again, I am proud to say we have much to celebrate here at SMMPS. Our children are well behaved, enthusiastic and generous in spirit. In the main they treat their teachers and peers with respect.

Last week we celebrated the feast of St. Mary MacKillop. Our children do live in her spirit and for that I am very grateful. They acknowledged the day, engaging in activities which helped them reflect on the life of Mary MacKillop. They celebrated Mass and enjoyed a sausage sizzle. Each child also received a bag of lollies in the tradition of St. Mary MacKillop herself, who was known to dig deep into her pockets and offer lollies to the poor children who otherwise never would have enjoyed lollies.

On Thursday of this week, we celebrate The Feast of the Assumption, which is our Parish Feast Day. We will celebrate with a Mass and each child will receive a cup cake to acknowledge the day.

The Feast of the Assumption is a significant day in the life of the Catholic Church. As Catholics we believe Mary was assumed into heaven. Mary was chosen to bring Jesus into the world and through her very life she pointed the way to Jesus. It makes sense then that Mary still points the way to Jesus, as she sits with him in heaven.



We know that in the tradition of our Church, the Rosary is a great way to connect with Jesus through his mother, Mary our Protector. Our late Pontiff, St. John Paul 11, spoke of the Rosary. His words really resonated with me:

"The Rosary has accompanied me in moments of joy and in moments of difficulty. To it I have entrusted any number of concerns; in it I have always found comfort...The Rosary is my favourite prayer. A marvellous prayer! Marvellous in its simplicity and its depth...Thus the simple prayer of the Rosary marks the rhythm of human life" St. John Paul II.

Thank you for your support with our School Closure. Unfortunately, due to the weather in Melbourne some staff did not make it to Sydney as many flights were cancelled. For the staff that did make it, we had a rich day of learning. Monsignor led us in the celebration of Mass, we visited the tomb of St. Mary MacKillop and we were taken on a spiritual pilgrimage for the afternoon, by Sr. Annie Bond rsj. We heard a lot about Mary MacKillop and Fr. Julian Tension Woods, the Co-Founder of the Josephites. We had time for reflection, journaling and for sharing in small groups and together. It really was a wonderful day. I trust our learnings will impact on our school and in doing so, make a difference in the life of your children.

LEARNING CONVERSATIONS TERM 3



FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY - AUGUST 15

On the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (to use the fancy name for this day), we remember when Mary was taken ("assumed") into heaven, body and soul, after she died. You will not find this story in the Bible. However, a tradition handed down from the earliest days of the Church says that Mary died in Jerusalem and was buried in a tomb. But when the apostles opened the tomb again, her body was gone. Why would God take Mary's body and soul into heaven? In part because Mary is special to God: she said "yes" to becoming the mother of Jesus. But God also wanted to show us that one day, all of us will share in the bodily resurrection of Jesus. Mary is the first person in the Church to experience the resurrection in its fullness.




We had a wonderful day of celebrations for our Feast Day last Thursday. Have a look at the photos from our mass and some of the activities that were done during the day.







BOOK WEEK PARADE

IEARINA TEACHING

Explore, Create, Empower Conference

On Thursday August 1st and Friday August 2nd a team of Inquiry focus teachers from across the school, Mr McCluskey and Mrs Yorston attended the Explore, Create and Empower Conference at Moonee Valley Racecourse. These two days of inspirational learning were an opportunity for teachers and leaders to delve further into best practice of how we can design powerful learning to inspire and empower our students to become highly capable learners. At SMMPS we believe when students are given the opportunity to learn something that has real meaning for them, they become more engaged and motivated in purposeful learning.



In P-2 the students learn through self directed inquiry during Discovery time. This opportunity is strategically shaped by teachers to enable students to learn more about themselves, how to live and work with others and the world they live in. In Years 3-4 Passion Projects and Years 5-6 80/20 time are opportunities for students to follow their passions and develop their ability to manage their learning more independently.

The conference had various keynote speakers such as,

John Spencer from the USA who spoke about "What happens when students OWN their own learning", as well as James Anderson who spoke about the concept of "The Agile Learner" and Luke Touhill who has an interest in physical design in the learning environment. Each of the keynote speakers also ran workshops throughout the day.

We were very privileged to also run a workshop on the Friday. Mrs McIlvena, Miss Fogarty and four Year 6 students, Celeste Sotelo, Emma Bosevski, Aaron Camilleri and Levi Gambian-Lugli presented to a group of teachers and leaders at the conference. The teachers presented a workshop on what student initiated inquiry looks



like 7 years on, as the current Year 6 students started their journey as Prep students.



At the end of the second day of the conference Celeste, Emma, Aaron and Levi spoke about what happens when we give students choice and develop their capacity to manage and own their learning. Then, in a room of 160 people filled with leaders, classroom teachers and principals, Aaron and Levi performed a mash-up of Queen songs as this was part of their 80/20 project. They were amazing and they re-energised everyone in the room with their singing and playing of instruments. We were proud of all the students who participated in this

experience, as well as, the rest of the Year 6 cohort and their teachers for managing and self directing their own learning.

Also a big thank you to Bili Bosevski for transporting the students to and from the venue.

History Box Incursion

Drama Toolbox- The Human Body

On Monday 12th August Year One had a visit from the Drama Toolbox. They were immersed in a range of fun and colourful activities that took them on a journey through the body. Through dressing up in costumes and acting out the role of neurons, blood cells and muscles they were able to learn how different body systems link and work together. All students thoroughly enjoyed their activities and even had a giggle at their Teachers acting out the part of 'Bazza'. On reflection, the Year Ones wrote a letter to The Drama Toolbox to recount their learning and share their new learning.

We loved when you came and taught Year Ones all about the Human Body. First we magically shrunk down and went inside 'Bazza's nose". It was hairy and full of boogers. - "I enjoyed dressing up as a heart and acting out how red blood cells travel around our body." Ethan (1G)

100 days of prep

Last Wednesday our Prep students celebrated 100 days of school.

They have been counting the days since their very first day of school back in February and it was a much anticipated day.

The day started with the Preps exploring '100' in Discovery Learning — What can you build with 100 cups? What would you do with \$100? The Preps had opportunities to make '100 Days' hats, imagined and drew pictures of themselves at 100 years old, made fairy bread (made with 100s but not 1000s!) They wrote about what they might look like, what they might work as and a skill they could learn before they reach 100. They even practiced walking like a 100 year old!

They ended the day with assembly where they received a balloon and certificate to remember their special day. Students dressed in amazing costumes on the theme of 100 and sang a counting song to 100 to an audience of well over 100 people.




