Hello Everyone,

This communication is largely to keep you up to date with all the wonderful happenings at our school.

On a positive note, we seem to have spiked with COVID infections and appear to be on the way down, with very few students with COVID and only one staff member out at this time. Let's pray that this trend continues as we move further into our Post-COVID normal world.

Government guidelines change on a regular basis. This is a constant challenge for school leaders as we try to sort the changes through and apply them. Each week school leaders of MACS schools across Melbourne meet online with Dr. Mary Oski, a Director of MACS. Dr. Oski supports us in unpacking the guidelines and answers our questions. This support is greatly appreciated as we navigate the way forward together.

## At this time, in short, the directions are:

- All children in Years 3-6 must wear masks. (This is due to the low vaccination rate in this age group.)
- Younger children are encouraged to wear masks, but this is not enforced. (Interestingly enough, the majority of cases of COVID in our school have been in the younger classes.)

- Staff, workers and volunteers at the school must wear masks and be double vaccinated. (Staff must be triple vaccinated by 25 March. We are still seeking clarity on workers and volunteers.)
- Any visitors entering a building must show proof of vaccination. (There is no requirement to QR Code.)
- We are to avoid large indoor gatherings for school events. (Ironically, the upcoming sacramental celebrations fall under the guidelines for religious ceremonies, which are looser than the school restrictions. We still class them as school events, so we have applied some restrictions at local level under the direction of our Parish Priest.)

It's not easy juggling the ever-changing restrictions. However, I sincerely appreciate the support of this marvellous community as we try and sort it all out. Thank you.

## **MOVING FORWARD**

Assembly and Prayer- We are to recommence an outdoor assembly on a Monday morning at 9:10am. With our enrolments standing at 538 children; we believe we can safely spread out on the Assembly area, maintaining some distance. We believe there is value in: gathering together as a community; praying together; focusing on St. Mary MacKillop and her wisdom; hearing from me, as Principal, promoting values and expectations and of course, singing the National Anthem. The assembly happens outdoors, so the risk is minimal.

We will also recognise a child from each level with a Principal Award. These awards will be given to children living the school values and the values of St. Mary MacKillop.

Parents are welcome to attend.

## ASH WEDNESDAY

Next week we will celebrate Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent. Lent focuses our attention on the need for reflection, as individuals and as communities. Inspired by Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice and resurrection, we are invited to reflect on what we are doing or not doing that strains or breaks our relationship with God, with others and with our deepest self.

Monsignor Portelli has recorded an Ash Wednesday Service to support the teachers in engaging their class in prayer next Wednesday afternoon. Each class teacher will then sprinkle the children's heads with ashes to mark the significance of Lent in the Catholic tradition.

This recording, of our Parish Priest in our parish church, is an important aspect of reconnecting our children to our parish.

Helpers to the Rescuel


On Monday 14th February, Year Two immersed themselves in an Incursion presented by Drama Tool Box. In a colourful and dramatic display about various habitats around the world, the students investigated the negative impact humans have on threatening the environment and native animals. From rubbish and pollution in the Great Barrier Reef, to tree cutting in the Amazon Rainforest and the influence of humans in the Australian Bush, students acted out different scenarios of environmental destruction. But all was not lost, The Habitat Helpers came to the rescue as students were able to identify ways in which they can encourage others to conserve our global environment. When back in the classroom, students created their own personal reflection about what they learnt and offered up different actions they and their families can do to help conserve our Earth.

## Fizzics Education - Year 4 Natural Disasters Incursion

On Friday the 18th of February, the Year Fours participated in a Natural Disasters incursion, presented by Fizzics Education. They were immersed in learning opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the formation of various natural disasters.

The students had the opportunity to utilise different materials to create their own natural disasters and discuss the effects they have on people and the environment. They also watched a fire simulation which explained the three elements needed to create bushfires: fuel, heat and oxygen. Further to this, students were exposed to other experiments relating to the effects of natural disasters on the environment. This involved learning about a seismometer, seeing how debris travels during a tornado and how tectonic plates that collide can form a volcano.

After the incursion the students were engaged in a reflection to determine their new understandings. Some reflections have been included below:

At our incursion we talked about volcanoes, bushfires and earthquakes. We made mini tornadoes in little bottles which was really fun. There was a game called Plague inc where you could be on the good or the bad side of a disease. If you were on the good side you had to cure people of a disease, on the bad side you had to infect as many people as you could. This was really fun and interesting. (Marcel Rosa)


At the incursion I learned that bushfires take a while to put out and you need oxygen, fuel and heat to start a fire. Fires occur a lot in bushland where it is dry and hot. We learned how easily a virus can spread and that tectonic plates when moving together cause an earthquake. (Olivia Ferraro)

## Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) On School

Students with Disability

## What is the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data?

Schools must now complete the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) every year. It counts the number of students who receive additional adjustments or "help" at school because of a disability. The NCCD helps governments plan for the needs of students with disability.

## Who is counted in the data collection?

To count a student in the NCCD, schools must think through some key questions:

- Is the student getting help at school so that they can take part in education on the same basis as other students?
- Is the help given because of a disability? The word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability</u> <u>Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA) and it can include many students.
- 3. Has the school talked to you or your child about the help that they provide?
- 4. Has the school kept records about the help they provide, the student needs and the reasons that the student needs this help? The school will need to keep copies of tests, student work, assessments, records of meetings, medical reports or other paperwork and information about how the student's learning is moving along over time.

Once the school decides that the student should be counted in the NCCD, they then choose a disability group and one of four levels of help that has been given to the student.

## What does the word 'disability' mean in the NCCD?

In the NCCD the word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA). There are four types of disability that the school can choose from: sensory, cognitive, social-emotional and physical.

Many students that need help at school can be counted in the NCCD. For example, students with learning problems, e.g. specific learning disability or reading difficulty (sometimes called dyslexia), health problems (e.g. epilepsy or diabetes), physical disability (e.g. cerebral palsy), vision/hearing loss and social-emotional problems (e.g. selective mutism, Autism Spectrum Disorder, anxiety).

Letters from doctors or specialists can be very helpful for schools as they plan how to support students with their learning. Schools do not need to have these letters before they can count a

student in NCCD. Teachers can use all that they know about the student's learning and the records that they have collected over time to decide if a student can be counted in the NCCD.

#### What sort of help does the school give students?

Students need different types of help at school. Some students need a little help sometimes while other students need a lot of help nearly all the time. The type of help given depends on the needs of the student. The help can include changes to the school buildings or grounds (e.g. ramps or things like special desks or chairs), extra teacher help in classes, special learning programs, changes to the work they give the student or extra adult help.

#### How will the NCCD be different this year?

All schools have been counting students in the NCCD since 2015. The government will use the NCCD data as part of the funding to schools.

#### What will the school need to know about my child for the NCCD?

Schools work together with families to understand the needs of each child. It is helpful if families give their child's teacher a copy of any letters or reports they have. The letters or reports will help the school understand the child and the help that they might need. Letters from doctors, psychologists, speech pathologists, doctor, and occupational therapists etc. can be very helpful for schools. These reports along with information that the teacher has (i.e. school based tests, your child's work and learning plans) helps the school to understand and meet your child's needs.

#### What happens to the NCCD data? Who will have the NCCD information?

Each school principal must check the NCCD data in August of each year. The school will give the information to the Catholic Education Office. The school will work with the Catholic Education Office to make sure that the NCCD data is OK before they give the data to the government. The government will not be given the names of any students or any letters or records. Please ask your school for their privacy policy if you need to know more.

#### Does the school need me to agree with them about counting my child in the NCCD?

Amendments were made to the <u>Australian Education Act 2013</u> and <u>Australian Education Regulation</u> <u>2013</u>). Schools do not need you to agree to let them count a child in the NCCD. You cannot ask the school not to count your child.

Registration is simple, just follow the 3 simple steps on your child's personalised flyer once you receive it and remember to add the codes for all your children attending this school.


Even if you registered last year, it's important that you do it again this year using your child's 2022 image code to link their images for the current year with your contact details.
